CAMZYOS is a prescription medicine used to treat:

adults with symptomatic obstructive hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (obstructive HCM). CAMZYOS may improve your symptoms and your ability to be active.

It is not known if CAMZYOS is safe and effective in children.

WARNING: RISK OF HEART FAILURE



CAMZYOS may cause serious side effects, including heart failure.

Heart failure, a condition where the heart cannot pump with enough force, is a serious condition that can lead to death.

You must have echocardiograms before you take your first dose and during your treatment with CAMZYOS to help your healthcare provider understand how your heart is responding to CAMZYOS.

Echocardiograms (echos) are imaging tests, a type of ultrasound study, which take pictures of your heart and show how well your heart is working.

People who develop a serious infection or irregular heartbeat have a greater risk of heart failure during treatment with CAMZYOS.



Get medical help right away if you experience new or worsening symptoms, including:

- shortness of breath fatigue leg swelling
- chest pain racing heart (palpitations) rapid weight gain

The risk of heart failure is also increased when CAMZYOS is taken with certain other medications. Tell your healthcare provider about the medicines you take, both prescribed and obtained over-the-counter, before and during treatment with CAMZYOS.


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What is obstructive HCM?

Obstructive HCM is the most common type of HCM—a condition that can affect the function of your heart.

HCM is a heart disease that can be inherited, which means it may run in your family due to genetics. It's estimated that HCM impacts between 1 in 200* and 1 in 500† people.

HCM causes the heart muscle wall to thicken and stiffen, making it harder for the heart to fill with blood. When HCM causes the heart muscle to get so thick that it blocks or reduces blood flow from the heart to the rest of the body, it's called obstructive HCM.




The majority of people with HCM have been diagnosed with obstructive HCM.

Obstructive HCM makes it difficult for your heart muscle to relax, so your heart must work harder and use more energy.

What is CAMZYOS?

If you have symptomatic obstructive HCM, talk to your doctor about CAMZYOS, a different treatment option that may be right for you.

CAMZYOS is a prescription medicine used to treat adults with symptomatic obstructive HCM and may improve both your symptoms and your ability to be active.



CAMZYOS is a capsule that should be taken at the same time once a day.

It can be taken with or without food. Take CAMZYOS exactly as your healthcare provider directs; see the Medication Guide for more details.

- Do not change your dose of CAMZYOS without talking to your doctor first
- . Swallow the capsule whole without breaking, opening, or chewing it
- If you miss a dose of CAMZYOS, take it as soon as possible, and take your next dose at your regular time the next day. Do not take 2 doses on the same day to make up for a missed dose
- Your doctor may change, temporarily stop, or permanently stop your treatment with CAMZYOS if you have certain side effects
- If you take too much CAMZYOS, call your doctor or go to the nearest hospital emergency room right away

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


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


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How does CAMZYOS work differently?


CAMZYOS is the first and only FDA-approved cardiac myosin inhibitor. CAMZYOS targets the source of symptomatic obstructive HCM.

Normal heart




Two proteins in the heart muscle, called myosin and actin, contribute to your heart pumping by connecting (making the heart contract) and releasing (allowing the heart to relax).

Heart with obstructive HCM



In obstructive HCM, myosin and actin form too many connections with each other, causing the heart to contract too much, which can make it difficult for it to relax.

How CAMZYOS works in a heart with obstructive HCM



CAMZYOS binds to myosin so that it "lets go" of actin, reducing the excessive connections between them. This action allows your heart muscle to relax more.

CAMZYOS to myosin

In people with symptomatic obstructive HCM, reducing the connections between myosin and actin may decrease the obstruction and improve heart function (how the heart relaxes and fills with blood).

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


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


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
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When compared with placebo

How was CAMZYOS shown to help in 2 clinical studies?

In the first study, CAMZYOS improved symptoms* and the ability to be active.[†]

A **30-week clinical study of 251 people** compared two groups of adults with symptomatic obstructive HCM. One group (123 people) took CAMZYOS while the other group (128 people) took a placebo. All participants who enrolled in the study were symptomatic (73% had NYHA Class II symptoms and 27% had Class III symptoms*). Though it wasn't a requirement, most of the participants (231) remained on their previous medicine, a beta blocker or calcium channel blocker.

*Symptoms were measured using the New York Heart Association, or NYHA, classification.

*The ability to be active was determined by measuring peak oxygen consumption, or pVO, which is the maximum amount of oxygen the body uses during exercise. This was measured during exercise testing on a bicycle or treadmill.

***Some improvement**=improved pVO₂ by at least 1.5 mL/kg/min. **More improvement**=improved pVO_a by at least 3.0 mL/kg/min.

The study first looked at how many people experienced either:



Some improvement[‡] in their ability to be active and an improvement in their symptoms

More improvement[‡] in their ability to be active and no worsening of their symptoms

Results showed that more people taking CAMZYOS achieved this outcome (37%, 45/123) compared with those taking a placebo (17%, 22/128).



Placebo—a pill that contains no medicine.

NYHA classification—a method that doctors use to place people into 1 of 4 categories based on their symptoms of heart failure.

Class I: No symptoms or exercise limitations. Class II: Mild symptoms, some exercise limitations. Class III: Noticeable symptoms with minimal physical activity; comfortable only at rest. Class IV: Severe symptoms while at rest.

CAMZYOS will not work for everyone. Individual results may vary.

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


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
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When compared with placebo in the first clinical study, CAMZYOS*:

Reduced the obstruction

At the beginning and end of the study, the obstruction in people's hearts was measured with an echocardiogram after they exercised. This was done to find out how much blood was able to pump out of the heart in millimeters of mercury, or mmHg. Doctors call this measurement the left ventricular outflow tract, or LVOT, gradient. A lower LVOT gradient means there is less obstruction in the heart.



Obstruction to blood flow within the heart decreased 4x more with CAMZYOS when compared with placebo.

People who took CAMZYOS had an average decrease in their LVOT gradient of 47 mmHg (started at 86 mmHg and went down to 38 mmHg), and people who took a placebo had an average decrease of 10 mmHg (started at 84 mmHg and went down to 73 mmHg).

Why is this important? In hearts with obstructive HCM, an obstruction can block oxygen-rich blood from being pumped throughout the body, which can lead to symptoms. blood flow

Thickened heart walls



LVOT gradient—When the heart contracts, oxygen-rich blood goes from the heart and out into the body through a pathway called the left ventricular outflow tract, or LVOT. The LVOT gradient is a measurement of blood pressure through this pathway. A lower LVOT gradient means that more blood is able to flow from the heart.

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Improved symptoms

Symptom improvement was defined as a lowered NYHA class at the end of the study.



~2 out of 3 people taking CAMZYOS had their symptoms improve.

Of those taking CAMZYOS, **65%** (**80/123**) improved by one or more NYHA class compared with 31% (40/128) of those taking placebo.

NYHA classification	Symptoms
Class I	No symptoms or exercise limitations
Class II	Mild symptoms, some exercise limitations
Class III	Noticeable symptoms with minimal physical activity; comfortable only at rest
Class IV	Severe symptoms while at rest

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Improved quality of life, as reported by patients

How much people were bothered by their symptoms and experienced physical limitations was assessed using the Kansas City Cardiomyopathy Questionnaire (23-item version)-Clinical Summary Score (KCCQ-CSS). Higher scores represent better health status.



3x greater improvement in symptom burden

From when they started the study to when it ended, people taking CAMZYOS reported an average change in score of +14, and those who took a placebo reported an average change in score of +4. The average baseline score was 71 for patients starting the trial.

The frequency and severity of people's shortness of breath was assessed using the Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy Symptom Questionnaire—Shortness-of-Breath subscore (HCMSQ-SoB). Lower scores represent less shortness of breath.



3x greater improvement in shortness of breath

From when they started the study to when it ended, people taking CAMZYOS reported an average change in score of -3, and those who took a placebo reported an average change in score of -1. The average baseline score was 5 for patients starting the trial.

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


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
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In the second study,

CAMZYOS reduced the amount of patients who were eligible for, or who chose to undergo, surgery at 16 weeks (avoiding surgery)

A 16-week study of 112 people compared two groups of adults with symptomatic obstructive HCM. One group (56 people) took CAMZYOS while the other group (56 people) took a placebo. When the study started, everyone had symptoms. Some (7%) had moderate symptoms (NYHA Class II), but most (93%) had severe symptoms (NYHA Class III or IV). Everyone's obstructive HCM was so advanced that they were eligible for heart surgery.

The study looked at how many people either:

Remained eligible for surgery at Week 16

Decided to proceed with surgery prior to or at Week 16

Results showed that CAMZYOS reduced the proportion of patients who were eligible for, or who chose to undergo, surgery. 18% of people taking CAMZYOS (~1 out of 5) and 77% of people taking placebo (~4 out of 5) remained eligible for surgery at 16 weeks or chose to undergo surgery prior to or at Week 16. Two people in each group decided to have surgery.



4 out of 5 people who took CAMZYOS experienced improvements in their symptomatic obstructive HCM to the point that they were able to avoid surgery* at 16 weeks

vs 1 out of 5 people who took the placebo

*No longer eligible and did not choose to undergo surgery at Week 16.

Most people in this study (95%) were also taking additional treatments for their oHCM such as a beta blocker, calcium channel blocker, disopyramide, or a combination of these.

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


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CAMZYOS REMS (Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategy)

Your doctor will help explain your participation in the REMS program.

In some patients, CAMZYOS can cause the heart to become too relaxed, increasing the risk of heart failure. Because of this risk, CAMZYOS is only available through the CAMZYOS REMS program, which is required by the FDA to monitor the safe use of the medication.



Talk to your doctor about how to enroll in the CAMZYOS REMS program.

In order to take CAMZYOS, you must be enrolled in the CAMZYOS REMS program. The program requires you to:

- Review and discuss the REMS Patient Brochure with your doctor to understand the risks of CAMZYOS and the symptoms of heart failure, including when to seek medical attention
- Tell your doctor about all prescription and over-the-counter **medicines** you take, including vitamins and herbal supplements, and alert your doctor and pharmacist of any changes to your medications while on treatment. Do not stop or change the dose of a medicine or start a new medicine without telling your doctor
- Get an echocardiogram to see if you are eligible for treatment with CAMZYOS (learn more about echocardiograms on page 13)
- Complete the Patient Enrollment Form with your doctor
- Get regular follow-up echocardiograms at the times recommended by your doctor while on CAMZYOS

If you have questions about the CAMZYOS REMS program, ask your doctor.

In order to prescribe and dispense CAMZYOS, your doctor and pharmacy are required to participate in the CAMZYOS REMS educational program and be certified in the risks and requirements of using CAMZYOS. Because of the special requirements of the CAMZYOS REMS program, CAMZYOS is only dispensed through REMS-certified specialty pharmacies and is not available through local retail pharmacies. Your doctor will give you information on how to get CAMZYOS from a specialty pharmacy. A specialty pharmacy will send CAMZYOS directly to your home and will continue to call you to coordinate medication shipments and help with any medication issues that may arise.

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

Monitoring with CAMZYOS

Regular echocardiograms will help your doctor evaluate how CAMZYOS affects your heart and monitor for safety.

Before you begin CAMZYOS, you will receive an echocardiogram to confirm whether CAMZYOS is right for you. An echocardiogram (also known as an "echo") is an imaging test, a type of ultrasound, that can be used to look at the heart to see how well it is working.



If you do start on CAMZYOS, you must schedule and attend echocardiograms as instructed by your cardiologist.

These tests allow your doctor to see how your heart is responding to treatment and monitor for safety. Based on echocardiogram results, your doctor may increase, decrease, or keep your dose the same—or may temporarily pause or discontinue your treatment. See echocardiogram schedule below:

NOTE: If you have not reached a stable dose by Week 12. you will continue with echos every 3 months until your cardiologist confirms a stable dose

*Previously required every 12 weeks.



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When you receive your medicine, ask your doctor to schedule your first 3 follow-up echocardiograms. Missed or delayed appointments can lead to an interruption in your treatment.

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


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Additional precautions around taking CAMZYOS

Your doctor needs to know the answers to these important questions before and during treatment with CAMZYOS:



Are you taking (or do you plan to take, or stop taking) any medicines other than CAMZYOS?



including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Taking CAMZYOS with certain medicines or grapefruit juice may cause heart failure.

Do not stop or change the dose of a medicine or start a new medicine without telling your healthcare provider.

Especially tell your healthcare provider if you:

- Take over-the-counter medicines such as omeprazole (for example, Prilosec®), esomeprazole (for example, Nexium®). or cimetidine (for example, Tagamet®)
- Take other medicines to treat your obstructive HCM disease
- Develop an infection



Do you have other medical conditions? Are you pregnant or breastfeeding or do you plan to become pregnant or breastfeed?

CAMZYOS may harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you become pregnant or think you may be pregnant during treatment with CAMZYOS You may also report your pregnancy by calling the Bristol Myers Squibb reporting line at 1-800-721-5072 or www.bms.com.

If you are a female and able to become pregnant:

- Your healthcare provider will do a pregnancy test before you start treatment with CAMZYOS
- You should use effective birth control (contraception) during treatment with CAMZYOS and for 4 months after your final dose of CAMZYOS
- CAMZYOS may reduce how well some hormonal birth control works. Talk to your healthcare provider about the use of effective forms of birth control during treatment with CAMZYOS

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

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

- You and your healthcare provider must both be enrolled in the CAMZYOS REMS program in order to have it prescribed. Talk to your healthcare provider about how to enroll and for more information about the program.
- Your healthcare provider and pharmacist will make sure you understand how to take CAMZYOS safely, which includes returning for echos when advised
- You can get CAMZYOS only from a certified pharmacy that is part of the CAMZYOS REMS program. Talk to your healthcare provider about finding a certified pharmacy. You will not be able to get CAMZYOS from a local pharmacy.

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

- take other medicines to treat your obstructive HCM disease
- develop an infection

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How should I take CAMZYOS?



Before starting treatment with CAMZYOS, your healthcare provider will do an echocardiogram (echo) to assess your obstructive HCM. Your heart must be regularly monitored with echos while on treatment to help your healthcare provider understand how your heart is responding to CAMZYOS.

How should I take CAMZYOS? (continued)



CAMZYOS comes in immediate release capsules, containing 2.5, 5, 10, or 15 mg of mavacamten. Each capsule is marked with the word MAVA and the number of milligrams (mg) it contains.

> **Inactive ingredients:** croscarmellose sodium, hypromellose, magnesium stearate (non-bovine), mannitol, and silicon dioxide.

Capsule: contains black iron oxide, gelatin, red iron oxide, titanium dioxide, and yellow iron oxide.

Take CAMZYOS exactly as your healthcare provider tells you.



How should I store CAMZYOS?

Store CAMZYOS capsules between 68°F-77°F (20°C-25°C). Keep CAMZYOS and all medicines out of the reach of children.
